



Historic Anniversary commemorative plaques

Many Old Georgians, especially those who boarded at the College, will remember the brass plaques that used to be mounted on the wall outside the Refectory. As may be seen from the wording on them, they commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the College in 1946 and were presented by the Midlands Branch of the OG Association which was formed that year.

Fittingly, the Chairman of the Branch was Mr. Leonard Makin, who, together with his brother, Lancelot, was one of the first six boys to enter the school in January 1896. The



foundering date is given on the plaque as 7th January, but research carried out in the 1970s shows that it was in fact 13th January.

All pupils, past and present, will know and understand the Latin inscription, 'Ad Majorem Dei Gloriam', at the top of the main plaque, but few will recognise the quotation – 'Exegi Monumentum Aere Perennius', which comes from Horace, the renowned poet from the

Augustinian age of the Roman Empire. Translated as, "I have completed a monument more lasting than bronze", while Horace was making this claim about the enduring legacy of his poetry, the Old Georgian donors used it to pay tribute to the lasting achievement of the founding Fathers, Fr. Barthelemy, and Fr. Nicot. They would surely have been gratified to see St. George's still flourishing in the 21st Century, having tripled in size and reputation since 1946.

Still on the subject of the wording of the plaque, the remaining part of the inscription – 'Laus Deo Semper' translates as 'Praise to God always'.

The plaques were presented to the Rector on 9 November 1946, after which, presumably, they were mounted outside the Refectory. Now, having recently been taken down to allow for the refurbishment and repainting of the passage there, they will be mounted instead in the Museum that is being created at Saints.

Also to go on display there will be an illustrated scroll recently found in an old map box in the College Archives, and which also celebrated the Golden Anniversary. Its provenance is unknown, but it is thought to have been the work of one of the Priests at the College in 1946.
